Information is Ammunition for HIV (IIA 4 HIV)

One of the reasons that teenagers are highly susceptible to HIV is because they lack correct information about the disease. As Peer Helpers you have been given the challenge of raising your schoolmates' awareness of HIV/AIDS and some of the issues surrounding the epidemic. In this section we would like to arm you with some common and not so common facts about HIV/AIDS to help you in your quest.

You know that... AIDS is caused by HIV (Human Immuno-deficiency

But did you know that ... HIV is a retro-virus,?(i.e. it infects human cells & then uses those cells' nutrients & energy to grow and re-



You know that... since HIV takes as long as 10 years to develop into AIDS, many infected person look & feel healthy.

But did you know

that... 1/5 of all infected persons do not know that they are carrying the virus?

You know that ... you can be infected with HIV during unprotected vaginal, oral or anal sex.

But did you know that...

although HIV transmission through deep'French'kiss-

ing is extremely unlikely, it is still possible?





You know that... for most HIV tests, a small amount of blood will be drawn from your arm & usually tested for the presence of HIV antibodies (i.e. the special proteins that are used to fight the infection).



But did you know that... in some cases urine/saliva is used in place of blood?

You know that ... HIV can also be transmitted when you share needles/syringes with infected per-

sons



But did you know that ... HIV can

survive on used needles/syringes for a

month or more & that this includes those used for body piercing You know that... blood, semen. vaginal fluids & breast-milk are carriers of the HIV virus.

that... sweat, tears, vomit. faeces & urine

RESPECT & PROTECT

How would you react if you found out that the person you sat next to in the maxi or the taxi is HIV positive? What about if you found out that someone in your class is HIV positive? How would you react then? Let's get a little closer to home now, how about if the HIV positive person is your best friend or a family member? How would you react to that person. Now take one more step into the land of what-ifs, how would you like to be treated if you were HIV positive?

The theme for this year's World AIDS Day - celebrated on December 1st every year - is 'Universal Access & Human Rights' in order to highlight the rights of persons with the disease. I don't know about you, but I think that persons with HIV/AIDS need to be treated with the same amount of respect and dignity as someone who doesn't have the disease. Peer Helpers, how are you going to commemorate World AIDS Day 2009 at your school? Putting up posters, handing out brochures, lighting candles and taking assemblies are all well and good, but we are challenging you to take a more long term approach to dealing with the issue of HIV/AIDS and discrimination against persons with the disease.

Lead by example. Demonstrate respect for persons with HIV/AIDS by not shunning casual contact with them. Protect those with the disease by providing your schoolmates with information aimed at the de-stigmatization of the disease and correcting those who you see disrespecting those with HIV. The small part that you play in your schools will go a long way toward making a difference.
